

John Lennox tells the story of when he was a student at Cambridge University 50 years ago, a professor called him to his office.

“He said, ‘Lennox, do you want a career in science?’

‘Then,’ he said, ‘in front of witnesses, tonight, **you must give up this childish faith in God**. If you do not, then it will cripple you intellectually and you will suffer by comparison with your peers. You simply will not make it.’”

Galileo Galilei

(considered the father of modern science):

“The Holy Bible and the phenomena of nature proceed alike from the Divine Word...God is known...by nature in His works, and by doctrine in His revealed Word.”

Johannes Kepler

(discovered the laws of planetary motion):

“The chief aim of all investigations of the external world should be to discover the rational order and harmony which has been imposed on it by God and which He revealed to us in the language of mathematics.”

Sir Isaac Newton

(discovered the 3 laws of motion and developed the math that became calculus):

“Gravity explains the motions of the planets, but it cannot explain who set the planets in motion. God governs all things and knows all that is or can be done.”

“Michael Faraday (1791-1867), arguably the greatest ever experimental scientist [and the inventor of the first electric motor], was a man of profound Christian conviction. As he lay on his deathbed, he was asked by a visiting friend, ‘Sir Michael, what speculations have you now?’ ...his response was robust: ‘Speculations, man, I have none! I have certainties. I thank God that I do not rest my dying head upon speculations for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed to him against that day’”
